Car Seat Safety

Car collisions are one of the leading causes of injury and death amongst children in the United States. The severity of injuries happens when children are not riding in the appropriate car seat according to their age or size. Proper installation can help reduce injuries and death of children.

BIRTH TO 2 YEARS

PA Law requires all children 2 years of age to ride rear-facing
If your child outgrows the weight and height limits of their seat, choose the next appropriate seat to keep him/her rear-facing

2 TO 3 YEARS

• Child should remain rear-facing for as long as possible

• When the child outgrows his/her rear-facing seat; place forwardfacing with a harness

4 TO 6 YEARS

Infant Seat,

Rear-facing only

• Children should remain forwardfacing with harness for as long as possible

Place your child in a forward-facing or combination seat without harness according to the manufacturer weight limits
If your child outgrows his/her forward-facing or combination seat without harness, place in a booster seat.

6 TO 8 YEARS

• Place your child in high back booster or forward-facing seat according to manufacturer's recommendations

• Booster seats should be used when your child has reached the weight limit, but has not reached the height requirement of 4'9"

PA law requires at least a booster seat until the child reach ages 8, 80lbs, and 4 feet 9 inches
Children must remain sitting in

the back seat

9 TO 12 YEARS

• Continue using a booster seat until your child can pass the Seat Belt Test

- 1. Shoulder seat belt fits across the shoulder and chest snugged
- 2. Lap seat belt fits across the lap (child's hips and upper thighs) snugged
- 3. Child's feet touch the car floor, knees bend over the vehicle seat, and back is against the car seat
- All children 13 and under must ride in the back seat
